February 25, 2024 | The Second Sunday of Lent



Dear Parish Ohana,

This Sunday's readings remind us of mountain-top experiences. In the first reading, on the mountain in the land of Moriah, Abraham is put to the test by God to see if he could sacrifice his own son Isaac, and without hesitation he faithfully obeyed. But in a dramatic fashion Isaac's life is spared and a substitute instead is found for the holocaust. And Abraham is rewarded for his unstinting faith. In the second reading, St. Paul alludes indirectly to another small mount. The evangelists call it Golgotha. From this mount, the Lord would bring salvation to the human race. And in the Gospel, on an unnamed mountain, Jesus appeared in his glory, transfigured along with Moses and Elijah.

Perhaps, you and I can see clearly that the transfiguration is a foreshadowing of the Resurrection. Yet Peter, James, and John see things differently. At this point in their lives, the disciples had been following Jesus for quite some time. They had already endured many trials, and yet they still weren't sure where this journey would take them. It is for this reason they were invited by Jesus to see the reason for following Jesus. This splendid episode offered a hint of where they were headed, heaven. Peter, mesmerized by the sight he saw did not want to go down the mountain to painful moments. Who wouldn't?

Each of us is like Peter at times, wanting a life that is pain-free and trouble-free. However, as He does continually throughout the Gospel, Jesus corrects Peter. He basically says to him: "You cannot stop on this mountain; we have work to be done down in the community before we can finally taste heaven eternally." Lent is a time when we are reminded that our true homeland is to be with God eternally in heaven. In the meantime, like the faithful Abraham, we have work to do.

A STORY OF HOPE FROM UGANDA



Adolf and his wife, Florence, are farmers in Akwangagwel, Uganda. The couple is dedicated to fighting hunger so that their family and others in their community can build thriving lives. They do this by farming, which helps their family to eat three nutritious meals a day, and by assisting others in their community to grow successful crops.

Each member of their household has an important role, like gardening, cleaning, preparing meals and caring for the animals. In the evenings, they enjoy spending time together as a family. Adolf is thankful for the free time to sit and relax with his children.

In the area where they live, the climate is very dry. Lately, the rainy season has been coming later than it used to. And sometimes, it rains too much all at once and causes flooding.

"It rains so heavily and destroys things," Adolf says. "So, the goodness of rain is taken away."

In addition, people come through their community and steal their food or tools. It makes it difficult to farm with these challenges—and that means food is harder to come by.

To overcome these obstacles, Adolf and Florence joined a Catholic Relief Services program where they learned new farming methods that help them grow crops even when it is hot and dry. They planted seeds that grow quickly, so that they can still have vegetables to harvest, even if there isn't much rain. This provides enough food to eat and to sell at the market for extra income.

"I have seen my children are happy because they are well fed," Adolf says.

Because of the successful life that he and Florence have built, they are sharing the knowledge they learned with their neighbors. As a leader in his community, Adolf works with others to increase their harvests, improve the land and build a safe and thriving community.

YEAR OF PARISH REVIVAL | June 11, 2023 - July 17, 2024

THE RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Following the first reading, there is a period of silence to reflect on what has been proclaimed. This silence helps us to better understand the reading. When we use silence for this purpose, we participate more completely in the Liturgy of the Word. After this period of silence, we raise our voices in song through the Responsorial Psalm. The Psalms that we proclaim at Mass come from the book of Psalms in the Old Testament. From the time of the Jews, Psalms were a regular part of worship—you could even call the book of Psalms the Bible's song book! The early Christians continued this practice of singing psalms in their worship. although now with а understanding of how those psalms spoke of Jesus Christ.

THE SECOND READING: The tradition of semicontinuous reading of the Bible at Mass goes back to the earliest centuries of the Church. When the end of the reading is reached, our response should be filled with joy at hearing God's Word: "Thanks be to God!" The Second Reading is a semi-continuous reading taken from the Letters in the New Testament of the Bible. Because the second reading follows a semicontinuous pattern, the second reading doesn't always tie in with the first reading or the Gospel. Why, then, do we proclaim this reading at Mass? The Letters in the New Testament were written to the early Church by St. Paul and the Apostles. These letters offered support, encouragement, correction and guidance to a young Church finding its way in a society that did not support them. We also need the direction of the Apostles, guided by the Holy Spiriti, as we make our way through a society that doesn't always support us in living our faith! Listen to the second readings as you would listen to the sage advice of a grandparent, mentor, or teacher.

The only exception to the semi-continuous second reading is during the seasons of Advent, Lent, and Easter. During these seasons, the readings are selected to highlight the theme of the season.
